

Active Stocks Score Some Wide Advances

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed strong Thursday, with wide gains made in selected issues. Trading was active.

The ticker tape was late in the final minutes as the overall market held most of a substantial gain on average.

Banker Ramo (new) had a big gain as most-active stock, holding a gain of about a point.

Virtually all of the 20 most-active issues were gainers.

Brunswick, Sunasco, Glen Alden, Ashland Oil, Occidental Petroleum, Goodrich and Sante Fe held sizable gains.

Volume was 16.13 million shares, compared with 15.59 million Wednesday.

The Dow Jones industrial average advanced 2.71 to 910.13.

Churchill Son, Randolph, Dies At 57 in U.K.

LONDON (UPI) — Randolph Churchill, the journalist son of the late Sir Winston Churchill, died "peacefully" at his country home early Thursday. He was 57.

Randolph, Sir Winston's only son, was his father's official biographer. He had completed two volumes on his father and was working on a third when he died.

Randolph Frederick Edward Spencer Churchill was born May 28, 1911.

Once in Politics

He made five forays into politics — one of them successful. His 28-year-old son, Winston Churchill III, made the announcement of his death. It said:

"Mr. Randolph Churchill died peacefully at his home in Suffolk in the early hours of this morning after a short illness. The funeral will be private. Arrangements for a memorial service will be announced later."

Co-Authors

Randolph and his son were co-authors of a book on the Arab-Israeli war of a year ago. It was entitled "The Six-Day War."

Randolph had one other child, 18-year-old Arabella. He was married twice and divorced twice. His first wife was Pamela Digby, daughter of the 11th Baron of Digby. Their marriage was dissolved in 1948.

His second marriage was to June Osborne, whom he divorced in 1961. Winston III was from the first marriage and Arabella from the second.

Bulgaria Hikes Hanoi Aid

TOKYO (UPI) — North Vietnam and Bulgaria have signed agreements under which Bulgaria will increase the amount of economic and military aid to be given the Hanoi government this year, Radio Hanoi said Wednesday.

Brussels High School Dedication Saddened

BRUSSELS (S&S) — The flags of America and Belgium were lowered to half-staff here Thursday for Sen. Robert F. Kennedy at the conclusion of a saddened ceremony dedicating the new Brussels American High School.

News of the senator's death was announced in the school auditorium at the start of the program. A moment of silence was observed by the numbed assembly.

"This should be a completely happy day," announced the deputy director of U.S. Dependant Schools in Europe, Edward C. Killin, "but it is my unhappy duty to tell you of Sen. Kennedy's death."

Supervising Principal Gordon G. Gartner told his 465 students from NATO and State Department families that the death and the dedication made it "a day of mixed emotions."

The flags were draped at half-staff after they were presented to the \$1.6-million, 22-classroom complex by Mayor Emile Saute of the Brussels suburb of Steerebeek and U.S. Army Col. John J. Farren Jr., NATO-SHAPE Support Group.

The Belgian air force band played the national anthems just before the flags were lowered and a chilly rain began to fall.

In his dedication speech Timothy W. Stanley, defense adviser with the U.S. Mission to NATO, referred to the assassination as "an act of senseless violence" and called education "the key to improvement without violence."

8th Inf Div GI Killed in Crash

BAUMHOLDER, Germany (S&S) — An 8th Inf Div soldier was fatally injured and another hurt when a five-ton Army truck turned over on a curve on Route 169 four miles east of here Tuesday morning.

Dead is Spec. 5 Arthur J. Gerhardt Jr., 33, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur J. Gerhardt, Lincoln Park, Mich. In the Baumholder medical dispensary with cuts on the head and left arm is Pfc. John A. Rogers, who, according to the division information office, was driving the truck.

Both men were assigned to Hq & A Co., 708th Maintenance Bn.

Rudi Dutschke Leaves Hospital Next Week

BERLIN (UPI) — The West-end Hospital said Thursday Rudi Dutschke, leftist student leader, would be released next week and would go to a sanatorium for a long rest.

Dutschke was shot in the head and chest April 11 in an assassination attempt. The shooting led to riots through West Germany.

French Economy Starts Rebound

PARIS (UPI) — The wheels of the strike-crippled French economy began turning slowly again Thursday after 19 days of the most disastrous nationwide tieup in the country's history.

More than one million workers in state-run industries and services were estimated to be back on the job. Hundreds of thousands more were drifting back in private industry.

No official figures were available. But it was estimated unofficially that by the end of the day about two-thirds of the 10

million strikers were back to work.

Trains began running for the first time in nearly three weeks. The Paris subway and bus networks also were starting up again — welcome news for tens of thousands of Parisians who have been walking to work.

Mail was being collected and delivered again for the first time since the nationwide walkouts began.

The government warned it might take a day or so before these services return to normal.

"Violence, declared the senior Defense Department civilian overseas, "destroys not only what is good but the chances to make it better."

4,308 U.S. Casualties Set Week Record

SAIGON (UPI) — The United States last week suffered 4,308 Vietnam war casualties, including both dead and wounded, the greatest number for any week of the war, U.S. military spokesmen said Thursday.

Many of them fell in fighting in and around Saigon, where government troops Thursday crushed the last remaining pockets of Viet Cong resistance, killing 167 guerrillas. Allied forces continued to guard against several more enemy battalions which U.S. intelligence sources said were attempting to infiltrate the capital.

The casualty total last week included 438 Americans killed and 3,870 wounded, the spokesmen said. The previous high figure had been in the week ended March 30, when 330 Americans were killed and 3,888 were wounded. The highest one-week U.S. death toll was 543 in the week ended Feb. 17.

Last week, South Vietnamese government forces reported 345 men killed and 1,163 wounded.

Enemy losses last week were put at 3,237 men killed.

The total number of U.S. dead and wounded in Vietnam climbed to 174,593, surpassing the 172,000 suffered by the French in the Indochinese war. The U.S. total included 24,360 dead and 150,233 wounded.

Maj. Arley Harper, an adviser fighting in Saigon's Cholon district, said Thursday, "There are still Viet Cong in two or three isolated pockets, but it is just a matter of time before we police up the area."

Auto Accident Kills Soldier

GELNHAUSEN, Germany (S&S) — A 3rd Armd Div soldier died late Wednesday in the 97th General Hospital of injuries suffered in a mysterious automobile accident on Rte. 40 near here Sunday.

Cpl. Dwight W. Henderson, 20, of Btry C, 2nd Bn, 6th Arty, suffered head injuries in the crash, the details of which the 3rd Armd Div information office in Frankfurt declined to reveal.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Henderson of Arlington, Va.

But the end of the strike movement that paralyzed the nation and brought it to the brink of civil war appeared to be in sight.

There still were many black spots.

Paris taxi drivers did not plan to return to work before Friday at the earliest.

Orly and Le Bourget, the two Paris airports, remained strike-bound because some members of the air control staff held out against returning to work, although most ground personnel were back on the job.
