

## West Germans Gird for Terror

BONN, (AP) — West Germany faced the threat of renewed terrorist violence yesterday following the assassination of a top judge and the hunger strike death of a jailed anarchist.

A group calling itself the **Red Army Faction**, Reorganization Section, claimed responsibility for the assassination of Judge Guenter von Drenkmann in anonymous telephone calls to German news organizations. One caller threatened further "executions."

Red Army **Faction** was a name used by the Baader-Meinhof anarchist gang. One member of the Baader-Meinhof group, Holger Meins, 33, died Saturday after a hunger strike in Wittlich jail near Mainz.

Left-wing demonstrators took to the streets in Berlin and Stuttgart yesterday following Meins' death, battling police with stones and bottles and smashing windows. Police in Berlin used tear gas to disperse the demonstrators, estimated at between 3,000 and 5,000.

Authorities summoned the country's 11 state interior ministers to an emergency meeting to discuss ways of heading off more violence following the death of Meins.

They also posted a record \$50,000 reward for the seven gunmen who killed Drenkmann, 64, president of West Berlin's Supreme State Court, in his apart-

ment late Sunday. Police said he was killed during an apparent kidnap attempt.

Police intensified security in West Berlin, where political leaders of the ruling Social Democratic party gathered for a meeting. Chancellor Helmut Schmidt and his predecessor, Willi Brandt, were among those attending.

Authorities said the judge who will

preside over the scheduled trial next summer of leading Baader-Meinhof members had been put under heavy security protection.

The gang is named after its two founders and is accused of killing seven persons in bombings, armed robberies and burglaries directed against "imperialist targets" in the late 1960s and early 1970s.
