

2 Sought by Bonn Badly Wounded By Dutch Police

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 11 (AP)—Two West Germans, one of them sought in the murder of Hanns-Martin Schleyer, were hospitalized in serious condition today after a gun fight with Dutch police.

Officials said the apartment they had used as a hideout was in an Amsterdam suburb near Schiphol Airport but they added that they had no evidence that any airport attack had been planned.

The West Germans were wounded by the police last night as they tried to shoot their way out of a public telephone booth. Three policemen were slightly wounded.

The men were identified as Christoph Wackernagel, a 26-year-old actor and a suspected member of the Red Army Faction, the name used by the Baader-Meinhof terrorist group, and Gerd Richart Schneider, 29, who is wanted for the bombing of a courthouse in West Germany.

The Dutch police had first identified Mr. Schneider as Rolf Clemens Wagner, 33, who, along with Mr. Wackernagel, is on a list of 16 extremists wanted by the West German authorities. The list was issued after Mr. Schleyer, a leading West German industrialist, was found murdered Oct. 19 in the trunk of a car in Mulhouse, France.

The Amsterdam police said the original identification had been made from photographs, but that fingerprints transmitted from West Germany had proved that the man really was Mr. Schneider, who has not been specifically linked with the Baader-Meinhof gang.

In addition to the Schleyer murder, Mr. Wackernagel, is suspected of involvement in the slayings earlier this year of Siegfried Buback, West Germany's chief federal prosecutor, and Jürgen Ponto, a prominent banker.

Amsterdam's chief public prosecutor, A. N. Messchaert, told reporters the

apartment of the suspects had been discovered by chance during an investigation into the kidnapping two weeks ago of Maurits Caransa, a wealthy Dutch real estate developer. The apartment had been placed under surveillance and Mr. Messchaert said there was evidence it had been used by Red Army Faction terrorists for several months.
