

# Germans Fear a New Terror Attack

BONN, Nov. 18—Extraordinary security precautions were in force throughout West Germany today, in reaction to rumors that radicals were preparing to stage a terrorist attack in memory of the deaths of three of their leaders in a Stuttgart prison a month ago.

When no incident had occurred by evening, officials cautiously suggested that the underground movement may at last have been subdued and that many of the hard-core fugitives had gone abroad.

The terrorists who were found dead in their cells in the Stammheim maximum-security penitentiary on Oct. 18 were Andreas Baader, Gudrun Ensslin and Jan-Carl Raspe. An international group of medical examiners determined that they had committed suicide.

Today, plainclothesmen kept a discreet watch at the suburban cemetery in Stuttgart where the three were buried side by side. Some young people were observed near the graves, but there were no disturbances. Another terrorist, Ingrid Schubert, who was found hanged in her
