Police hold Schleyer, suspects in shoot-out

BERNE, Tuesday.

Swiss police today arrested a man and a woman believed to be West German terrorists, wanted in connection with the October murder of West German industratist Hanns-Martin Scheeper.

A Justice Ministry spekesman said it was possible that the pair were Willy Peter Stoll and Juliane Plambeck who were on a wanted list cirealated by West Ge-man authorities after the killing of Dr Schleyer.

Folice interrogating the cou-le are carrying out indentity checks in co-operation with West Gennan police at Wis-shaden.

Folice arrested the pair

shot and 'wounded two Swiss frontier guards checking their Frenchregistered car at Fahy on the Swiss-French border about 50 miles north-west of here.

Stoll, aged -27, and Plambeck, aged 25, were among 16 suspected terrorists whose photographs were published by West German authorities after the murder of Dr Schleyer, 62-year-old president of the West German Employers' Federation.

Dr Schleyer was found shot dead in the boot of an abandoned car in Mulhouse, France, on October 19, after Bonn authorities refused to release 11 failed Baader-Meinhof urban guereillas in exchange for his

freedom. He had been kida upped six weeks earlier in a bloody street ambush in Cologne.

A police statement said a Customs officer halted the car on a road banned to traffic in the wooded Iura mountain country.

lie alerted a colleague by "walkie-talkie" radio and not into the car, directing the driver to Fally Customs post.

Inside the Customs building the woman pulled out a pistol and shot at both officers, wounding one in the leg and the other in the shoulder.

The pair then jumped back in the car and fled, abandoning the vehicle at the outskirts of Porcentruy, a small town, about seven miles away.

They got into a taxi at

the local railway station and headed for Delemont. But police there had been alerted and set up a road block where they seized the pair before they could resist, the statement said.

Both had false documents and were detained in police cells at Delemont. — Reuter.
