## 2 West Germans Seized After Border Gunfight

DELEMONT, Switzerland, Dec. 20 (AP)—Swiss border guards captured a West German couple near here today after an exchange of gunfire at a border checkpoint. The Justice Ministry said the suspects were believed to be on West Germany's list of most-wanted fugitives, and that one was believed to have been involved in the killing of Hanns-Martin Schleyer, a prominent industrialist.

Two Swiss customs guards were wounded in the gunfight, one seriously, and the male suspect was shot in the foot, the police said. After the gunfight, the couple escaped. They were said to have fled in their car and later in a taxi until they were captured at a roadblock near Delemont.

A Justice Ministry spokesman, Ulrich Hubacher, tentatively identified those arrested as Peter Stoll, 27 years old, and Juliane Plambeck.

Mr. Stoll, a member of the group

called the Red Army Faction that grew out of the Baader-Meinhof terrorist gang is a principal suspect in the slaying of Mr. Schleyer in October, the police said.

Miss Plambeck, 25 years old, escaped with two other women from a West Berlin prison last year. She is suspected by Austrian police of being involved in the recent kidnapping of a Vienna businessman, Walter Michael Palmers, who was released unharmed after his family paid a reported \$2 million ransom.

UTRECHT, the Netherlands, Dec. 20 (AP)—A Dutch court sentenced a West German terrorist, Knut Folkerts, 25 years old, to 20 years in prison today for killing a Dutch policeman and trying to kill another in a Sept. 22 shootout.

## A Third of Cabinet Replaced in Seoul

SEOUL, South Korea, Dec. 20—President Park Chung Hee replaced a third of his 20-member Cabinet today. It was his third Cabinet shuffle since Choi Kyu Hah was appointed Prime Minister in December 1975.

The most prominent changes today involved portfolios of national defense, education, commerce and industry, agriculture and forestry and the newly created post of energy minister. Altogether, seven posts were changed.

Foreign Minister Park Tong Jin, Kim Jae Kyu, director of the Korean Central Intelligence Agency, and Interior Minister

Kim Chi Yol were all kept on. The retention of these officials indicated that there would be no major change in the policy of the Government.

## Gunman Holds 21 Hostages At U.S. Base in Philippines

MANILA, Wednesday, Dec. 21 (UPI)—A gunman held up a bank inside the United States naval base at Subic Bay in the Philippines yesterday, seized 21 hostages and demanded a helicopter to fly him out of the installation, a Navy spokesman said.

The spokesman said negotiations with the gunman, who was not immediately identified, were continuing 18 hours after he entered the branch of the Filipino-owned Prudential Bank.

The Navy spokesman said the gunman was a Filipino with a pistol and two shotguns.

## U.S. and Bolivia Agree To Exchange Prisoners

LA PAZ, Bolivia, Dec. 20 (AP)—The United States and Bolivia have reached agreement in principle to allow prisoners to serve their sentences in their home countries.

Of the 32 American citizens who are now being held, however, only about a half dozen are expected to be able to leave immediately when the treaty takes effect. Three others could go home if higher courts concur. Four others come up soon for parole. The rest are awaiting trial.

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
