Blasts Rip West German Police Offices

FRANKFURT, West Germany, May 12 (AP)—Bombs exploded at German police buildings in Munich and Augsburg today as the authorities investigated the blasts at a United States Army headquarters compound in Frankfurt that killed an American colonel and injured 13 persons on Thursday.

American military police and German civilian police declined to speculate on whether the bombings were politically inspired.

The latest bomb attacks were made on city police headquarters in Augsburg and the Bavarian state police office in Munich.

Two bombs went off shortly after noon on the fourth and fifth floors of the Augsburg building, injuring at least one police official, authorities said.

The explosion in Munich followed three hours later and was considerably stronger than the Augsburg blasts, police officials said.

The United States Army identified the officer killed in the bombing at the Frankfurt compound on Thursday as Lieut. Col. Paul A. Bloomquist, 39 years old, of Salt Lake City. Colonel Bloomquist, a decorated veteran of two tours of duty in Vietnam, is survived by his widow and two children,

Ten of the 13 persons injured at the U. S. base were Americans, most of them officers and enlisted men. Three Americans and two Scotswomen remained hospitalized, the Army said. They were reported to be in good condition.

Frankfurt police officials, meantime, withdrew a march permit for leftists who had planned a protest parade against American policy in Vietnam.

Officials in Munich estimated bomb damage to the newly built police office, autos and nearby businesses at \$155,000.

A spokesman said an anonymous telephone caller had warned the nearby state pay office of the impending blast. The warning was transmitted to the police office, but the explosion came before the building could be evacuated.

"We are completely in the dark," a Bavarian justice official said of the explosion. "If extremists did this, then it is even more threatening. It brings back memories of conditions in past eras."

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
