

# German Bomb Acts Claimed by Guerrillas

BONN (AP) — A letter signed by urban guerrillas blamed for the bombings that killed four U.S. soldiers in West Germany threatens new action next Friday against "U.S. imperialism." The letter, received Thursday by the newspaper Frankfurter Rundschau, called on those who oppose American policy in Indochina to foment class struggle. But it did not specify what the next anti-American action would be.

## Name Told

The letter was signed "Red Army Faction." The extremist band claims responsibility for three of six bombing attacks in the last two weeks, including one on May 11 that killed a U.S. officer at a Frankfurt Army base.

West German authorities believe the group also planted the two bombs that rocked the U.S. Army's European headquarters in Heidelberg on Wednesday, killing three U.S. soldiers. But the letter laid no claim to that attack. French and West German police are trying to determine whether there is any connection between the German bombings and explosions that damaged the U.S. consulate and the American Legion headquarters in Paris on Thursday.

A group calling itself the Committee of Coordination issued a communique after the Paris bombings saying they were a protest against the war in Indochina.

## Session Held

Chancellor Willy Brandt met today with Interior Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher and other security aides pledging his government would do all it can to capture the bombers.

Many security officials believe the Red Army Faction is led by a West German Bonnie and Clyde named Ulrike Meinhof and Andreas Baader, who have headed the most-wanted list for more than two years. Police say their gang has robbed banks, stolen cars, killed at least two policemen and plotted unsuccessfully to kidnap Brandt.
