## Bible-Toting Marines Sentenced to Brig

NAPLES (S&S) — Five Biblecarrying enlisted Marines were found guilty of willfully disobeying the orders of their commanding officer at a special court- nartial here Tuesday.

At the same time they were acquitted of the more serious charge of mutiny resulting from a row June 10 over the standing of watches.

During the day-long trial the farines steadfastly contended that they took their stand again t carrying out their duties because of religious convictions.

In testimony it was pointed out the defendants — all neatly barbered lance corporals assigned to the 95-man Marine barracks here - were regular visitors a: the Christian Center, a church-sponsored facility for U.S. servicemen, in downtown Naples.

Sentences Listed

Sentenced to terms of two to four months' confinement in the Navy brig at Rota, Spain, reduced in grade to E1 and ordered to forfeit all pay during confinement were Rotal B. Mueller 22 and Sixto B. M. Mueller, 22, and Sixto R. Molina, Terry L. Hartley, Michael R. Joens and Michael D. Jones,

In addition to the charge of willfully disobeying an officer, Mueller and Joens pleaded guil-

ty to failure to report to an appointed duty station. The remaining three defendants were acquitted of the same charge.

Mueller and Joens drew sentences of four months, Hartley was given three months and Jones and Molina two months. The military judge, Cmdr. L. M. Farrell recommended suspension of all confinement in excess of two months.

12 Witnesses

Details of the June 10 barracks showdown between the defendants and their military superiors unfolded during the testimony of eight government and four defense witnesses.

Reportedly incensed because a religious sticker had been removed from the private property of one of the defendants, Joens got into an argument with Cpl. Harold E. Decker, described as a fellow Christian. Also drawn into the argument, it was testified, was Mueller, who was ready to go on duty. Mueller took off his guard belt and said he would refuse to stand his watch to prove his belief in Jesus.

Joens then took similar action and ran to the Naval Support Activity guard post, where he reported his decision to Hartley who called by telephone to ask that he be relieved.

Jones and Molina then followed with similar refusals.

Both Mueller and Joens, the

only two men to testify in their own behalf, said they may have been wrong in turning down an order but contended they took the action in line with religious beliefs.

Both professed a love of country and then admitted they had been wrong in acting as they

The Rev. Jesse Miller, 52, the ordained Baptist minister who directs the Christian Center. said in testimony for the defense that the five men were devout followers of Christ, but that they had been wrong in refusing to carry out military orders.

Before sentencing, the defendants individually took the stand to make unsworn statements relating to their religious beliefs and their subsequent behavior on June 10 and June 12.

"None of the Christians on defense here used God as a crutch. We're here because we made a stand for Jesus," Hartley said.

'Souls Saved'

"Our souls are saved. Our mission is to help others, because one day we're all going to be facing a judge bigger than any judge on earth. As for man's laws I did do something out of the ordinary and I'm sorry for this. But I cannot stand to see God trod on.

"I was at the point where I was put against the wall," Mo-lina said. "I still feel strong about the Marine Corps. But I am disappointed in the testi-mony of some of the people here today.

"Myself and the Christians here have studied quite a bit,"
Jones said, "We kept our faith.
I have no doubt that Jesus will come soon. I feel it is my obligation to go elsewhere and to spread the word.

"Before I turned to Jesus I lidn't have any hope in life. I even thought of doing away with myself," Jones said.

'Real Concern'

"But now I have found the Lord and my real concern is for America. I think of Sodom and Gomorrah and their perverted sex. God did away with these cities. I worry because the United States has turned its eyes away from the Lord. I may not be able to help restore my country, but I may be able to help some people.

"I haven't lost faith in the Lord. He works in strange ways. But I'm willing to take the punishment because I consider what I did to be wrong," Muelle" said.

It was pointed out during proceedings that all five Marines enlisted in the service and that Mueller and Hartley are veterans of the Vietnam War.

### Ellis Calls RedBuildup 'Alarming'

NAPLES (S&S) — The Warsaw Pact continues to "build and grow at an alarming rate" in NATO's southern region, Air Force Lt. Gen. Richard S. Ellis warned Wednesday as he took command of Allied Air Forces in Southern Europe.

Speaking at colorful changeof-command ceremonies which marked the 20th anniversary of AIRSOUTH, Ellis called the southern region one of the most important in the alliance.

"I look forward to my new role as a challenge," Ellis said. The general reported to AIR-SOUTH from the 6th Allied Tactical Air Force in Izmir. Tur-

In ending nearly four years of duty in Naples, departing AIR-SOUTH commander Lt. Gen. Fred M. Dean pointed to the continuing need to improve both the quality and quantity of the air forces in the southern re-

Dean praised the Italian, Turkish and Greek air forces for their contributions to the defense of the region.

Policy Shift The Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, Gen. Andrew J. Goodpaster, pointed to the continued deterrent role played by AIRSOUTH.
Adm. Richard G. Colbert,

commander-in-chief, Allied Forces Southern Europe, said the contributions of AIRSOUTH in the past two decades is "an eloquent example of balanced NATO forces in action."

Gen. Vincenzo Lucertini, Italian air force chief of staff, praised Dean for his contributions to the command.

## 5 Bomb Pranksters Arrested in Frankfurt

FRANKFURT (AP) — West Cerman police seized five pranksters Wednesday who harassed authorities in Frankfurt with their bomb threats.

A spokesman said three men were taken into custody when they made their threats from city emergency call boxes. One of them later admitted he spent about 30 marks (almost \$10) for such calls from public phone booths.

Another two were caught with the aid of a special phone switch police installed to fight the recent flood of anonymous calls. "Here is the Baader-Meinhof group — a bomb will go up today," the spokesman quoted one of the suspects as saying before he was taken into custody.

He was referring to the gang of that name accused of several

#### **Soviet Police Arrest** Dissident Leader

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet secret police Wednesday arrested historian Pyotr I. Yakir, a leader of Moscow's tiny dissident political community, and searched his apartment, friends said.

Yakir, 49-year-old son of a general executed under Stalin's regime, was arrested for "anticonstitutional activity which he had systematically carried on for several years," Soviet sources said.

### Rhein-Main Flood Causes Damage

RHEIN-MAIN AB, Germany (S&S) - Isolated flooding in this base's Gateway Gardens housing area has caused more than \$10,000 damage, according to an Air Force spokesman.

The flooding, caused by unusually heavy rain Friday. filled the basement of the housing area's theater knocking out an electric substation that supplies power to an adjacent small shopping complex. Stores in the complex are expected to reopen soon, but it is not known how long the theater will remain closed. The cost of repairing the power plant may run as high as \$25,000.

Flooding also damaged some basement apartments and household goods stored in buildings in the housing area, the spokesman added.

# Assails Kissinger

PARIS (UPI) — A Hanoi peace delegation spokesman said Wednesday that presidential adviser Henry A. Kissinger's current visit in Peking is aimed at cutting off North Vietnam from her allies.

"The Nixon administration should hold direct negotiations with the representatives of the Vietnamese people," spokesman Nguyen Thanh Le said in calling once again for the United States and South Vietnam to return to the suspended

Vietnam peace talks. The United States broke off the Paris talks May 4 because it said that neither Hanoi nor the Viet Cong showed any willingness to negotiate the issues seriously.

"We demand the resumption of the talks," Le said, but U.S.

GIJON, Spain (UPI) — Two trains collided head-on Tuesday in a tunnel three miles west of Gijon killing one person and injuring 24, the news agency Europa Press reported.

delegation officials said they had received no specific request from the Communists for a meeting Thursday.
