## Lod Terrorist Eats, Answers Captors

TEL AVIV (AP) — The surviving Japanese terrorist who waged the massacre at Lod Airport is accepting food, drink and cigarettes from his Israeli interrogators and is answering questions in broken English, Japanese diplomats said Satur-

A diplomat said Kozo Okamoto, 24-year-old member of the three-man Japanese death squad, had at first refused to eat or drink because "evidently he suspected he would be poisoned."

Interrogation of Okamoto con-

tinued as four wounded Puerto Rican survivors of the airport slaughter prepared to leave for New York Sunday with a special doctor aboard a jetliner of Air France, the airline that carried the Japanese killers to

Air France was paying all expenses for the four Puerto Rican pilgrims, who were identified as Lydia Martinez Martinez nez, who is three months preg-nant and whose husband was killed in the Tuesday carnage; Jose M. Vega-Fanqui, whose wife died in the massacre;

Maria del Carmen dia Flores, and Rita Morales de Achero.

Sunday afternoon a U.S. Air Force C141 transport plane will take the bodies of at least 16 dead Puerto Ricans home for

Pilgrims to the holy city of Jerusalem, they had flown here aboard the same plane as the Japanese fanatics and were wiped out by bullets and gre-nades inside Lod Airport terminal, where the casualty toll was 26 dead and about 80 wounded.

A counselor at the Japanese


Embassy gave sparse details of Okamoto's interrogation, but no details of the questioning or what the young killer had di-vulged. He said Okamoto was now more relaxed with his captors.

The Japanese interpreter aiding in the interrogation was dis-pensed with after Okamoto began speaking in halting Eng-

Kenji Fukunaga, special Japanese government envoy who flew here Friday to offer Japan's apologies for the massacre, was to meet Israeli Premier Golda Meir Sunday morn-ing, and later to meet President Zalman Shazar.

Meanwhile, police and air-ports throughout Europe were alerted for another anti-Israeli massacre attempt by Japanese extremists within the next seven days, London police said Saturday.

They said at least two leading members of the Japanese Red Army are known to be in Europe and are believed to be planning a raid similar to the one at Lod Airport.

#### Quaint Campaign Train

### McGovern Chugs Through California

FRESNO, Calif. (UPI) -McGovern whis-George S. tle-stopped down California's lush Central Valley aboard an old-fashioned campaign train Saturday, preaching his "prairie populist" philosophy and blaming "the man in the White House" for rising food prices and falling farm profits.

Traveling the same rail route Robert F. Kennedy rode to victory in the 1968 California primary before his assassination on election night, McGovern spoke to growers and field hands from the back of an ob-servation car, denouncing farm conglomerates, high property taxes and President Nixon's "phoney parity formula" for agriculture.

With only three campaigning days remaining before the crucial California primary and leading Hubert H. Humphrey by 20 percentage points in a major poll, McGovern whistle-stopped with his family, staff and 160 newsmen through nine cities, ranging from the state capital of Sacramento to tiny Delano, birthplace of Cesar

Chavez' farm union organizing movement.

Meanwhile, Humphrey pressed his campaign in populous Los Angeles, meeting with black clergymen, conducting broadcast interviews and hand-shaking along sidewalks.

At the meeting with 100 clergymen and their wives, Humphrey joined in singing "We Shall Overcome" and told them, "Give me the chance, bless your hearts, and we'll move this country.'

McGovern's whistle-stop tour, which cost his campaign more than \$7,000, penetrated the heartland of California, bread basket of the nation's most productive agricultural state. The 300-mile-long valley is home for 2.5 million people, most of them Democrats, ranging from conservative land barons to migrant Chicano grape pickers.

McGovern's campaign oratory was geared for all elements. To the field hands, he called for unionization and collective bargaining.

To the growers, he declared: "Farmers in California and elsewhere have been blamed for rising food prices in the grocery store. But the fault does not lie with the man who works the land. It lies with the man in the White House.'

The South Dakotan said President Nixon maintains his Phase II economic program is working but "the farmer receives too little, the consumer still pays too much and the secretary of agriculture is still spending too much time diverting attention from the real problem."

#### FBI Ends Probe of Bremer's Travels

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI has closed its investigation of the travels of Arthur Bremer, charged with shooting Alabama Gov. George Wallace, and concluded that Bremer acted alone, the Washington Post reports.

In its Saturday editions, the Post quoted federal sources as saying that hundreds of federal agents have tracked Bremer's movements across the United States and Canada—the routes he took before the May 15

shooting.
In addition, the newspaper said, a Canadian police report revealed that Bremer was seen in Ottawa at least three times in areas visited by President Nixon April 13-15.

Bremer's travels during April and May, as traced by the FBI, included attendance at several Michigan rallies for Wallace

and another Democratic presidential hopeful, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, and a hurrled trip to New York City, the Post story said.

Bremer now is in the Balti-

more County Jail, awaiting state and federal trials on 28 charges, including attempted murder, in the shootings of Wallace and three bystanders at a political rally in Laurel, Md.

#### Gang Links Checked in Berlin Blast

BERLIN (AP) — Plans for freeing a woman prisoner in West Berlin and for robbing a bank were found Friday, police reported.

The material, a spokesman said, was found in a blasted apartment believed to have been set on fire deliberately to destroy evidence.

Police said there was no indication as yet that the apart-ment belonged to Ulrike Meinhof, co-leader of a terrorist

gang with Andreas Baader, who was captured in Frankfurt Thursday.

Officers said, however, that occupants of the apartment apparently fled it in great haste after the arrest of Baader was

confirmed. Police President Klaus Huebner said a connection between the apartment and the Baader-Meinhof gang could not be ruled

out. Despite the explosion and fire, a machine gun, an automatic rifle, two pistols, ammunition, wigs, false papers and license plates, official stamps for documents, make-up, enough chemicals for 100 explosive devices and 5,000 marks or \$1,560 in cash were found.

The plans for freeing a prisoner referred to a women's jail in the city but the bank was not further identified.

Baader was freed in a gang shootout police claim Miss

Meinhof engineered two years ago in West Berlin while Baader was serving a prison sentence. A series of bank robberies has been blamed on the

Baader-Meinhof gang.

The luxury high rise apartment blasted Thursday was rented last October by a woman about 30 using a false name, police said.
