

Paper Says MacLeod Was a British Spy

HAMBURG (UPI) — Ian MacLeod, the 34-year-old Scotsman shot by a policeman last month during a sweep of apartments suspected of housing members of the Baader-Meinhof anarchist group, worked for the British Secret Service, a West German newspaper claimed Sunday.

The tabloid newspaper Bild am Sonntag said it had learned from "informed sources" that MacLeod's task was to gain the confidence of the group and discover any links existing between the local anarchists and leftist factions in Britain and Ireland.

The newspaper said MacLeod did gain the confidence of the group, especially of Gudrun Ensslin, with Andreas Baader and Ulrike Meinhof, one of the top three members of the anarchist group.

MacLeod discovered that Katharina Hammerschmidt, who gave herself up to West Berlin police last week, had taken refuge in France, Bild said. It claimed he also found out that Jan-Carl Raspe, a member of the gang arrested with Baader in early June, had a home in London and had opened an account with the Midland Bank there.

The newspaper said it had been assured that neither the West German police nor the legal authorities knew anything of the Scotsman's secret activities.

A police officer killed MacLeod a week ago Sunday during a 6:30 a.m. sweep of apartments suspected of having provided refuge for the anarchists, who had claimed responsibility for a series of bombings in West Germany.

Blasts at U.S. Army headquarters in Frankfurt and Heidelberg killed four American servicemen and injured 30 other persons.

The death of the naked, unarmed Scotsman, from a sub-machine-gun bullet fired through the door of his bedroom by the police officer led to a furor in West Germany and Britain.

The Bonn government has expressed its regret to MacLeod's mother, who has retained a lawyer to represent her interests. The lawyer has accused the police of acting on insufficient evidence against an innocent man.

MacLeod, who worked as a clerk in the British Consulate in Stuttgart before going into private business in Stuttgart,

had been a "very popular" member of the British community there, a consulate spokesman said.

The Stuttgart public prosecutor's office said police had information which linked MacLeod to the "Baader-Meinhof" group, the remnants of which are still being hunted in mopping-up operations similar to the one in which MacLeod died.

Five hundred mainly youthful demonstrators — 300 in Stuttgart and 200 in Frankfurt — held marches and rallies Saturday to protest the shooting.

No violence was reported.

Intestinal Problem Hospitalizes Truman

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Former President Harry S. Truman was admitted to Research Hospital in Kansas City Sunday with what his doctor described

as a "lower gastrointestinal problem."

Dr. Wallace H. Graham, personal physician to the 88-year-old former chief executive, described Truman's condition as "satisfactory."

A hospital spokesman said routine examinations were planned, including X-ray studies of Truman's gastrointestinal tract.

The spokesman, John Dreves, said Truman was in good spirits as he arrived at the hospital with his wife, Bess, from the Truman home in nearby Independence, Mo. Dreves said Truman chatted with hospital employees as he was taken to his room in a wheelchair.

Dr. Graham said the ailment was related to the intestinal problem which sent Truman to the same hospital for 12 days in early 1971.

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gun, which he had checked with the crew. Vaughn said he arranged for this passenger, about 30, a special policeman for a U.S. company, with authority to carry a weapon, to be given his gun so he could back Vaughn up in trying to disarm the man.

Vaughn said he did not intend to try that while the plane was still in the air.

"When we landed at Saigon Airport, I told the military under no circumstances to allow the aircraft to depart. I'd already made my decision.

"I told the first officer, 'I'm going down into the aircraft, confront the hijacker and do what I think is proper.'"

"The man was standing in the

rearmost part of the airplane holding one of the stewardesses hostage. He was threatening her with his knife — and it was a 10-inch switchblade. He seemed like a dedicated individual.

"He said, 'Don't come any closer because, if you do, I'll blow this airplane up.'"

"I replied, 'Don't get upset. We'll find an answer to this problem.'"

"While I was talking to him, he said, 'I represent the Peoples Republic of Hanoi and this is a revenge act. Your bombers have wrought havoc on our people.' He told me the plane would be destroyed after it reached Hanoi.

"I told him, 'We have a language problem. I can't understand you too well. Let me come closer.'"

"I moved about two feet closer and saw my opportunity to jump him.

"I dislodged the 'bomb' from his hand and this spun him around and we went down. He tried to get me with his knife and he missed. He was a fanatic

and his knife was flaring around."

Vaughn's short-sleeved shirt was ripped open. His undershirt also was torn but he was not scratched. His shirt also had a bloodstain, apparently from the hijacker.

"I managed to keep my stranglehold on his throat and to move my body away. I shouted (at the armed passenger), 'Kill the son-of-a-bitch,' and the passenger put five bullets right into him while I was holding him by the throat.

"I want to tell you something. I took that fellow by the back of his neck and legs and threw him right out of that aircraft. He was already dead. We knew that.

"I just felt it was an offense to have him anywhere near that plane. I must have had the strength. I felt he had the weight of a ping pong ball when I threw him out."

In Hong Kong, a spokesman for Pan American said, "As far as we can tell, the hijacker's name was Nguyen Thai Binh, but no passport or ticket was found. He apparently boarded the plane in Honolulu."

An airline official said the hijacker was carrying in his briefcase 60 to 70 photographs of anti-Vietnam war demonstrations which apparently had taken place in the United States. In some of the photos, the official said, the hijacker was addressing crowds.

Daley Forces Win Point in Court
