

Another guerilla suicide in prison

MUNICH, November 13. — Another Baader-Meinhof urban guerilla committed suicide in prison yesterday.

Ingrid Schubert, 33, who was serving 19 years for attempted murder and bank robbery, was found hanging by a bedsheet from her cell window bars in Munich's Stadelheim Prison.

Reinhold Beck, a spokesman for the Bavarian Justice Ministry, said today that an autopsy performed a few hours after her death indicated that she committed suicide.

Schubert, a former member of the Baader-Meinhof died nearly a month after three other guerillas — **Andreas Baader**, Gudrun Ensslin and **Jan-Carl Raspe** — were found dead or dying in their cells at Stammheim Prison near Stuttgart.

Their deaths, which authorities also termed suicides, came hours after West German commandos stormed a hijacked Lufthansa jet on October 18 in Mogadishu, Somalia, and freed 85 passengers and crew held hostage for the release of 11 jailed German terrorists.

The release of the four guerillas was demanded last month by air hijackers and the kidnapers of industrialist Hanns-Martin Schleyer.

Mr. Beck said the autopsy, conducted at a university of Munich clinic, established that Schubert, a former medical assistant, died from violent action against the neck as with a typical hanging.

He said the investigators, led by Dr. Wolfgang Spann of the International Academy for Court Medicine, found no clues indicating foreign action.

According to Mr. Beck, Schubert's lawyer, Hartmut Waechter, was present during the autopsy.

He said officials had no idea of Schubert's motive. But another official speculated she may have become despondent over the arrest in Amsterdam last week of Christoph Wackernagel, one of the 16 suspects in the kidnapping and murder of Schleyer.

Until August, she was held at the top-security Stammheim Prison.
